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#### **OVERVIEW**

In April of 2005, 190 dioceses were invited to participate in the annual *NFP Program National Profile* survey of diocesan natural family programs. This was the first year that participants could complete the *Profile* online. The resultant data base will assist the DDP/NFP office to more effectively analyze NFP trends each year. Seventy or 37% of the dioceses submitted data either electronically or by mail. As in previous years, the following data "snapshot" indicates that certain aspects of NFP programs remain relatively unchanged with slight improvement in some areas.

- # Many dioceses include NFP in their programs of marriage preparation (75%). However, most newly married couples failed to take full advantage of natural family planning in their conjugal life. This assumption is strongly suggested when one compares the total number of marriages in the Church (232,060¹) with the total number of individuals (9,287²) as reported in the survey that took a full course of instruction in NFP. Obviously, more must be done to inspire couples to fully embrace the Gospel of life.
- # A couple of dioceses and increasing numbers of individual priests require engaged couples to take a full NFP course of instruction before marriage. Other dioceses are considering adding a full NFP course of instruction in their marriage preparation guidelines.
- # When viewed nationally, diocesan NFP programs vary from comprehensive to nonexistent. Some dioceses have very strong educational programs that integrate NFP into all educational efforts on human sexuality, marriage, and family life. Through hard work and dedication, other dioceses have made tremendous strides in improving the quality of their NFP programs in order to meet the *Standards for Diocesan NFP Ministry*. But across the nation, as one diocese improves its NFP program, another may experience a reduction in program size through teacher loss, budget cuts, and/or diocesan restructuring.

- # From diocese to diocese there is a wide range in the diocesan funding of NFP programs. Thirty-six percent of dioceses surveyed budgeted less than \$5,000 for NFP programs in 2004. Forty-eight percent of all NFP diocesan programs operate on less than \$10,000 per year, while 30% have annual budgets of \$10,000 to \$29,000. Twenty-two percent of dioceses spend from \$30,000 to more than \$70,000 for their NFP programs. In some dioceses NFP instruction is covered by insurance plans. In most dioceses, NFP programs share funding, materials, and staff support of an umbrella department, e.g., Marriage and Family Life Office.
- # Typically, NFP is not identified as a specific line item in diocesan budgets. Less than half (46%) of diocesan NFP programs are asked to submit an annual report.
- Wolunteers are the unsung heroes of diocesan NFP programs. The majority of diocesan NFP programs (77%) depend on volunteers to sustain their programs. A little over a third (37%) of the dioceses give modest stipends to cover personal costs, e.g., transportation, baby sitters, materials, etc.
- # There has been slight overall improvement in the amount of scheduled time dedicated to NFP in marriage preparation programs. The time given to NFP is not lengthy; in 84% of Pre-Cana programs, it is less than one hour. The majority of diocesan marriage preparation programs make some effort to provide at least rudimentary NFP information to various groups, with special attention directed toward couples preparing for marriage, e.g., booklets, fact-sheets, witness couple talks and NFP course instruction. Through NFP introductory sessions more than 76,789 individuals received basic information on NFP.

Finally, the pastoral question that must be faced when examining each diocesan NFP effort is: *Can couples who wish to be faithful to Church teaching on responsible parenthood readily get the NFP support they need?* The answer to this question will determine how best to plan and support local diocesan NFP ministry.
